DESCRIPTION:

There is a large body of evidence examining the impact of case management in the context of health insurance and health care delivery. However, there is far less literature available to describe the effects of care management in the context of employment injury. In addition, there is a gap in our knowledge relating to a better understanding of overall workers compensation claims and their occurrences and frequencies.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES:

The goal of this project is to evaluate the effects of a set of case management services on outcomes of interest to workers' compensation insurers, employers, and injured employees. In addition to looking at other outcomes claims cost and return to work time for various injuries.

SCOPE:

This will be a quantitative study using claims data from a third party workers compensation administrator that administers claims for employers nationwide. We will use regression analysis on pooled cross-sections to estimate the impact that case management and other interventions may have on cost and time-away-from-work outcomes.

HOW THIS IS DIFFERENT THAN RELATED RESEARCH:
